Darren is also one of the original officers to begin working with the Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team, which commenced in the fall of 2019 and sees a police officer partnered with a mental health clinician, from the Huron Perth Crisis Centre and Helpline, to respond directly to calls for service that could include an element of mental health or crisis. In regards to his work with youth throughout his career, Darren has seen the importance of providing strong, and easily accessible mental health services to youth, to assist them with the complexity of problems they face on a daily basis. Darren has had the opportunity to work directly with many staff members at the Huron-Perth Centre and has seen, first-hand, the positive impact that their work can have on the youth they serve. As such, Darren agreed to join the Board of Directors with the Huron Perth Centre in 2021, in order to provide insight from his perspective of working with youth in crisis and as a first responder to mental health crises in our community.
